Colossae was a city in modern Turkey known for its black wool and dyes. It was an area of tremendous economic wealth, but spiritual poverty. Paul has never visited Colossae, but his apostolic office still wields great spiritual influence over the congregation there.

Passage: Colossians 1

2. As Paul launches into a defense of the preeminence of Christ (vv. 15-23), remember that he does so in order to preserve His deity, which is under heretical attack. Choose three aspects of Christ's preeminence (there are more than 3!) that are highlighted in verses 15-20. Explain how they should impact how you live & think today.

3. Once Paul finishes describing the preeminent Christ (vv. 15-20), he begins to describe who that Christ relates to humans (vv. 21-23). What was the ultimate point of Christ's reconciling work (vv. 22-23)?

4. As you consider the point of Christ's reconciling work, take a look at your own life. Are you living a holy & blameless life before him? What are some areas that need to change for this purpose to be fulfilled?

5. What was the point of Paul's gospel ministry (v. 28)? Who are you helping to become "mature" in Christ?

Passage: Colossians 1
